recommendation to verify Paul's apostleship (v1). Paul responds by telling them, are my letter. Paul goes on to give the glory for everything, he didn't consider himself special and realized that neither he nor other ministers they favored were responsible for anything of spiritual value without Gods on them.

Paul makes the case, that his calling into the gospel ministry has caused him to live his life as an, nothing to hide. Because of this, he is not afraid to be questioned about his apostleship (v1-2). His commitment to a life of was for the purpose of making sure that his life wasn't a hinderance to others receiving the gospel (v3-6). One of the ways the Corinthians tried to on the authenticity of his ministry was by highlighting things they thought made him inferior to other ministers they approved of like his poverty, physical appearance and oratory skills. Paul doesn't defend himself but highlights that all his sufferings and insufficiencies serve the purpose of bringing God (v7-18).

Continuing from the previous chapter, Paul highlights the fact that regardless of what this life may bring us, by way of hardships, this life is not the chapter (v1). With eternity in view, the Christian lives their life purposefully knowing that the possibility of awaits them (v2-10).
