The book of Titus is another epistle written to one of Paul's ministry protégé's. Titus had served with Paul in Galatia (Gal 2:1-3) and at Corinth (2 Corinthians 8:23). Now Paul was sending him to the island of for a ministry assignment, to help several house churches. Crete was an island in the Eastern Mediterranean sea. The Cretans had a reputation that preceded them. First of all they were known as rugged warriors, hired by the likes of the Romans and even King as mercenaries for war. They were also known as, and gluttonous (Titus 1:12). Many Jews would immigrate to Crete for various reasons. They would also return back to their homeland for various celebrations. One such celebration was the festival of Pentecost. We learn from Acts 2:11 that it is very possible that some Cretans were present at the evangelistic explosion during that festival (Acts 2:8 & 11). If so, that would bring a influence to an otherwise unevangelized area. We also know that sailed by Crete several times on his missionary journeys according to Acts 27.

Paul gives instruction about the content of what Titus should be teaching (v1-7). His teaching would be age and gender specific. Paul now address those who are involved in servitude (v9-10). Paul ends this section with truths about the of God and the reason for the believer to make these teachings part
of how they live (v11-15).
